Respecting LIfe & Amendment 4

Every human matters from the moment of conception to natural death. Dr. Jerome Lejeune demonstrated that a new life is formed at the moment of conception, an entirely unique individual. This genetic code is unrepeatable and contains numerous distinct characteristics.

'Amendment to Limit Government Interference with Abortion' will appear on Florida's November ballot. Its misleading language posits dangerous outcomes. Abortion in Florida is currently legal up to six weeks. However, this amendment proposes increasingly secularized world that to legalize full term abortion, remove all restrictions before viability, and allow any healthcare provider to sanction this course of action.

Unregulated abortion will be established in our state if the amendment passes. By not defining "viability," it permits second and third trimester abortion. It does not require a medical doctor to approve the procedure, but instead authorizes all "healthcare providers" to determine if an abortion is "necessary to protect the patient's health". Meaning that any healthcare provider- a physician, nurse, or even an abortion clinic employee- can approve a late



term abortion for treatable. temporary health concerns. Additionally, Amendment 4 seeks to eliminate parental consent prior to receiving an abortion. I which case, it will become the only medical decision a minor can make without a guardian's knowledge. It will also eliminate government regulations on abortion, including the health and safety requirements that protect women.

In An article he wrote in May, Archbishop Wenski encouraged us to defend life because "as confirmed Catholics we are to witness in an God matters and because God

matters, human beings, created in God's image and likeness, including the unborn, matter as well." For this reason, the Archdiocese of Miami launched a campaign opposing Amendment 4 in October. It is meant to educate voters on impacts Amendment 4 will have. The campaign includes educational outreach, social media engagement, calls to action, prayer and reflection events, and voter educational workshops.

The archdiocese intends to protect the unborn and women from the dangers of abortion. The unborn and women from the dangers of abortion. The Respect Life Pregnancy Help centers provide free services to support women during pregnancy and until the child is two years old.



Respectlifemiami.org suggests alternatives to abortion, offers counseling, and provides healing for those who regret a past abortion.

Proceeds earned from fundraisers hosted by our school throughout the month of October will be sent to the Respect Life Offices. As Mrs. Egan, a theology teacher and Respect Life Club moderator, mentions: "the school participated in the National Pro-Life Day of Silent Solidarity, where students give up their voices for the day for all the babies that have lost their lives due to abortion." Students wrote encouraging pro-life messages around the school during National Pro-Life Chalk Day. The Respect Life Club also hosted the Seniors vs Staff volleyball game.



Veteran's Day



All Souls Day

All Souls' Day is an emotional occasion for Christians. It is dedicated to remembering loved ones who have passed. It's preceded by All Saints' Day, which honors saints and those in purgatory. On All Souls' Day, people pray for the souls of the departed and reflect on their memories.

The tradition originated in the 10th century. It was introduced by a French abbot and now saint, Odilo of Cluny. He spent the day praying for the deceased. The Catholic Church later adopted this practice, making it a significant day in their calendar.

All Souls' Day is known to take different forms in other parts of the world. The most popular variation is found in Mexico, where they celebrate DÃa de los Muertos. Families create ofrendas (offerings) to honor their loved ones who have

passed. They adorn these altars with photos, candles, pan de muerto (bread of the dead), marigolds, and sugar skulls. In Poland and Hungary, cemeteries radiate with the soft glow of thousands of candles. Each one symbolizes a prayer. In the Philippines, families gather in cemeteries. They clean graves, light candles, bring food, and occasionally camp overnight to be close to their loved ones.

All Souls' Day is a moment to pause and remember. People reflect, pray, and honor the souls of the deceased. Whether through quiet prayers or visiting tombstones, the day is filled with meaning. It reminds us that death is not the end, but rather a journey toward eternal life.
